3. From Research to Practice

This session features interactive discussion of the persistent Latino male educational achievement gap and highlights key lessons learned from the work of The Texas Education Consortium for Male Students of Color. The consortium is a statewide effort in Texas that focuses on improving Latino and African American student success with membership including four-year universities, two-year colleges, and school districts.

4. Students Speak, We Listen

CCCSE Findings on Latino Student Engagement Evelyn Waiwaiole, Director, Center for Community College Student Engagement

In 2012, Latinos earned fewer than 5% of all associate degrees awarded to all races. Among low-income students from underrepresented racial and ethnic groups, half begin at community colleges—more than double the rate of their peers from high-income families. Participants in this session will discuss Center findings on Latino student engagement, hear from Latino student voices, and consider questions and issues to be addressed in their own institutions to foster transfer and college completion.

5. Strategies for Successful Transfer for All Students

Successful transfer practices are the result of intentional action coupled with intra- and inter-institutional collaboration that is focused on serving a diverse population with varying needs.
