From the Airport

<u>RENTAL CAR</u>: Car rental counters are located in Terminal A. To drive from the airport to the hotel, take 281 S., which will turn into I-37 S. near the downtown area. Follow I-37 S. and exit 141C toward Nolan/Houston Streets. Turn right onto McCullough Avenue, left onto Avenue E, right onto Houston Street, and left onto Losoya Street. The hotel is on the right but the parking garage is across the street.
